The Jesus of Paul's Letters

aul once regarded Jesus as a renegade Jew, a blasphemer of God and an enemy of Israel. He was single-minded and whole-hearted in his efforts to destroy the early church. Then Jesus struck him down, called his name, rebuked his sins, and changed his life. From the moment of that encounter Jesus became Paul's "magnificent obsession." With single-minded and whole-hearted devotion he labored and suffered, lived and died to proclaim Jesus Christ to others. He wrote to the Philippians, "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain" (Philippians 1:21).

In his letters Paul often names himself as the servant of Jesus, and throughout his letters he calls Jesus, "Lord." He uses a word for Lord that commonly refers to God in the Greek translation of the Old Testament called the Septuagint. The use of kryios, by a man who was a Pharisee trained in strictest monotheism speaks volumes about his "high" Christology.

Paul's gospel labors were strongly independent of the other apostles. Although he identified them as true apostles, however, he also insisted that consultation with them added nothing to what he had been taught by the Lord and was teaching in the church. He preached the same Jesus as they did.

Paul shared with John the identification of Jesus as Creator. "By him," he wrote to the Colossians, "all things were created: things in heaven and on the earth, visible and invisible" (Colossians 1:16). To Christians, he wrote to the Corinthians, "there is but one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom all things came and through whom we live" (1 Corinthians 8:6). All that we can see, even with our vision notably enhanced by microscopes and telescopes, was created by the Word of God. This creative Word entered history as Jesus of Nazareth.

The Creator, as Jesus, became the Redeemer. "God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross" (1Corinthians 1:19-20). Paul shared the belief of the gospel writers that the death of Jesus was an atoning sacrifice. He declared the resurrection of Jesus to be a powerful affirmation of His son-ship to God and his savior-hood of believers (Romans 1:1-6). He argues that all mankind, Jews and Gentiles, are guilty of sin and unable to save themselves, since the law could define sin but could not deliver from sin. The way out of sin, the way to God was Jesus. "There is no difference[between Jews and Gentiles], for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Jesus Christ" (Romans 3:22-24).

To Paul, Christ was the "last Adam," and all who are in Him are destined to share His eternal glory. We are in Him by faith, and the Spirit is in us to witness that we are the adopted children of God. This makes us "heirs of God and co-heirs with Jesus Christ" to God's eternal riches (Romans 3:17).

The Redeemer is now the Intercessor. Jesus is "at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us" (Romans 8:24). This truth brings to believers the sweet assurance that nothing "will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:35, 38).

Jesus, as Creator, Redeemer, and Intercessor, was the subject matter of Paul's preaching. "God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ." God-in-Christ was one Paul preached about. God-in-Christ was also the one who preached through Paul. God had given to Paul and his preaching colleagues "the ministry of reconciliation" and "the message of reconciliation." They stood before men imploring, "Be reconciled to God." They were "Christ's ambassadors" and God was "making his appeal" through them (2 Corinthians 5:18-20).

In a similar vein Paul wrote to his Thessalonian converts, "We also thank God continually because, when you received the word of God, which you heard from us, you accepted it not as the word of men, but as

it actually is, the word of God, which is at work in you who believe (1Thessalonians 2:13). They heard Paul, but at the same time they were hearing the Lord, and gospel preaching, that carried within it a power to take minds and hearts captive to Christ.

To the Corinthians he wrote, "We preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Gentiles, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God" (1Corinthians 1:23-24). Paul was not ashamed of the gospel for it could do what the wisdom of the world could not do, deliver persons from sin and unite them to God.

Of "first importance" to Paul as a preacher were the crucifixion and the resurrection of Jesus. These were events in history that occurred in fulfillment of the Scriptures (1Corinthians 15:3, 4). They were not incidental or accidental. In them the saving purpose of God was actuated. Both events could be confirmed by a large number of eye-witnesses. The resurrection of Jesus was the "first fruits" of a harvest that the resurrection of his followers will complete (1Corinthians 15:20-24). Our lives in this world and in the next, therefore, depend utterly upon the work of Jesus Christ.

In one of the finest passages ever written about Jesus Christ and gospel preaching Paul said, "We do not preach ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. For God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made his light shine in our hearts to give us the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ" (2 Corinthians 4:5-6). Jesus, in his human life and as our divine Lord, is the image of God and the light of men. He dispels the darkness of our spiritual ignorance and reveals what God is and what we should be.

The cross of Christ provides the way by which God, without compromise coercion, can remain just and yet be the justifier of those who believe in Christ. The resurrection validated and interpreted the cross. It affirmed the Father's acceptance of the Son's sacrifice, and therefore it affirms His acceptance of all who come to the Father through the Son.

"In Christ" is a favorite phrase in Paul's correspondence. He speaks of believers collectively as "saints in Christ" (Philippians 1:1), "brothers in Christ" (Colossians1:2) and "the faithful in Christ" (1 Corinthians 1:2). Believers are "created in Christ" (Ephesians 2:10), "included in Christ" (Ephesians 1:13), "justified in Christ" (Galatians 2:17), "forgiven in Christ" (Ephesians 4:32), "sanctified in Christ" (1 Corinthians 1:2) and "approved in Christ" (Romans 16:10). Believers experience "salvation in Christ" (2 Timothy 2:10), "life in Christ" (1 Timothy 3:12) and "joy in Christ" (Philippians 1:26). Believers possess "faith in Christ" (Philippians 3:9), "hope in Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:19) and "love in Christ" (2 Timothy 1:13). Believers receive "every good thing in Christ" (Philemon 6) and "every spiritual blessing in Christ" (Ephesians 1:3).

The list is impressive, and it cannot be true if Jesus was just another prophet, teacher, reformer and founder of a religion. He is all these but much more than all these. To Paul, "Christ is all and is in all....God's chosen people" (Colossians 3:11, 12). He is our very life (Colossians 3:4). Just as we live physically in air and with air in us, so we live spiritually in Christ and with Christ in us. His word dwells in us and His peace rules in us (Colossians 3:1, 11, 15, 16). "Christ in you," is to Paul, "the hope of glory" (Colossians 1:27).

The Jesus of Paul's preaching and writing is coming again. Paul was convinced by "the Lord's own word" that He would "come down from heaven" to raise the dead and take his people to be with Him forever (1Thessalonians 4:15-18). This glorious prospect is a primary means of "comfort" to Christians who are afflicted and persecuted now. Paul also declares that when "the Lord Jesus is revealed from heaven in blazing fire with his powerful angels," He will "punish" those who have rejected the gospel and will grant "relief" to those who have faithfully followed Him through troubled times (2Thessalonians 1:7-10). The final destiny of all persons is in the hands of Jesus, the coming righteous Judge.

Paul wrote from a different perspective and experience than did the authors of the Gospels, but he proclaimed the same Jesus. All the main ingredients of their Christology can be reproduced from his epistles. He was in constant conflict and competition with false prophets and their false gospels (Galatians 1), but never at odds with true apostles. He did not simply parrot them, but he and they preached "one Lord, one faith, one baptism." The four Evangelists would say a hearty "amen" if they heard Paul preach that Jesus "is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on him, for "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved" (Romans 10:12, 13).

Summing up: the Jesus whom Paul preached was the Son of God and the Savior of believers. He existed before time and history and is the Creator of all things. Love brought the Creator into creation as the Redeemer. His death was a judicial human blunder, but a spiritual divine conquest. He atoned for sin and now intercedes for sinners. At some point in the future He will return to judge

STEPHEN MANLEY Jesus Pusher

Stephen Manley is a Jesus Pusher. It sounds a bit odd perhaps; some people "push" drugs or alcohol, sex or entertainment, and I guess in our own ways we all have something we "push." But I have met few individuals with such an intense focus on one thing. For Stephen Manley, his one thing, his only passion, his single desire is Jesus.

In his own words: "I am a Jesus pusher!!!! I am an undaunted, courageous, stouthearted, bold, adventuresome, brave, fearless, gallant, heroic, lionhearted, unafraid, unflinching, valiant Jesus pusher. I cannot help myself. He is startling and He has overwhelmed me. I do not speak of ideas about Jesus or historical information concerning Him. I speak about Him. I am a Jesus pusher!!!! I am a mastered, possessed, addicted and obsessed Jesus pusher. There seems to be no way to quit. But who would want to?"

And Stephen does everything he can to "push" Jesus on everyone. No, Stephen is not aggressive, mean, or harsh, but he is intense, focused, and dedicated. Perhaps that's because of the foundation



God laid in his life at a young age.

The Foundation

Stephen Manley, born July 18, 1942, grew up in the home of an Indiana Methodist pastor, which provided the basis for his early spiritual growth. Stephen received his call to ministry at the age of seven and began filling his father's pulpit at the age of eleven. But as a young man entering high school, he was conflicted and torn with the reality of his spiritual life. There must be something more. During the lunch hour one afternoon, Stephen stole away from the high school and walked across the street to his dad's church, hiding himself in a classroom to think and pray. There was no emotional surge, no lights in the sky, no booming voices, but Stephen left the church radically altered in heart and mind; Christianity is about intimacy with Jesus! Stephen concluded if the essence of Christianity is oneness with Jesus – the outside God getting to be inside, living and sourcing one's life - then it is critical to keep one's focus upon Jesus throughout the day, not merely a few minutes each morning in devotions and prayer. As a way to develop such a habit of focus, Stephen decided every time the school bell rang he would pray:





platform for Stephen's life. Stephen found that as he dove into the written Word (Bible) he was diving into the Living Word (Jesus). The Bible was not a dreary book to study in order to prepare sermons, it was an exciting avenue through which he could experience the living person of Jesus, develop deep intimacy with Him, and be continuously pressed and transformed by Truth (Jesus). As he is so fond of saying, "We do not handle the Word of God; it handles us." Even now, some fifty years later, the Word continues to become more precious and important in his life. At age seventeen, now attending Taylor University and pastoring a local Methodist church, Stephen met, and two years later, married Delphine Oliver. For the next five years, Stephen and Delphine ministered in the pastorate of both the Methodist and United Missionary Church Denominations. While in the pastorate, the Manleys adopted their first child, Stephen Christopher Manley, in March 1967. The following year, July 1968, they adopted their second child, Evangeline Faith Manley (Vangie). The expansion of the Manley family came at a critical time in Stephen and Delphine's call to ministry. After pastoring for seven years, Stephen, now twenty-four, made the leap into full-time itinerant evangelism, which became his call for the next forty-one years.

For his first four years in evangelism, Stephen travelled alone. In 1971 he moved his ministry under the umbrella of the Church of the Nazarene; and in 1972, Stephen brought his wife and children onto the road, where they ministered together for the next ten years. Again in 1982, Stephen found himself traveling alone as the two children, now in their



high school years, stayed at home with Delphine. As young Steve and Vangie attended high school, Delphine established

and administered the office for Stephen Manley Evangelistic Association (SMEA), based out of their home in Upland, Indiana. It was only after Steve joined the army and Vangie graduated high school that Delphine joined Stephen back on the road.

The international arm of SMEA began in February 1985, continuing for the next fifteen years. Stephen and Delphine dedicated nearly three months of every year to international evangelism, traveling throughout Africa, Central and South America, and Europe. In 1989 they spent six months within nine different countries in Africa. These trips often consisted of pastoral training during the day and evangelistic meetings in the evenings.

In addition, the Manleys began an evangelist intern program, taking young men and women on the road with them during the summer months. The emphasis of the intern program was on practical ministry as well as Biblical training and transformation. The interns would minister to the children and teens at the summer camps and church meetings Stephen preached, while attending a daily one-hour training with Stephen



that included sessions on theology, evangelism, saturation Bible study,

practical ministry, and sermon preparation. For the next twenty years over 65 interns experienced life on the road with Stephen and Delphine Manley - seeing holiness, a servant-hearted lifestyle, and evangelism lived out in day-to-day living. Since the program's inception in 1987, Stephen had a desire to begin a one-year school of practical ministry that would invest, train, and mentor a new generation of people called to ministry. His desire was to give individuals an opportunity to learn how to study the Word, experience growth and transformation, and provide practical ministry training within a needy community. However, the desire for the school would have to percolate for a few years.

In 1986, Nazarene Bible College invited the Manleys to teach at the school, even with their busy preaching schedule. During winter semesters, Stephen and Delphine would live in their RV in Colorado Springs so Stephen could teach Monday night through Wednesday morning and then catch a flight to preach at a revival meeting Wednesday night through Sunday. Delphine was also an adjunct professor teaching under Verla Lambert in the Women's Study Series during several of those NBC years between 1986 and 1992.

The Lord soon pointed Stephen and Delphine toward Tennessee. In December of 1998, they responded to the Lord's leading and moved SMEA's ministry headquarters from Upland, Indiana to Lebanon, Tennessee, not realizing at the time that this would become the location of the practical ministry school Stephen had long felt a divine stirring over.

The Future

After 41 years in itinerant evangelism, the Manleys felt a clear call from God to come off the road for the purpose of starting the Cross Style School of Practical Ministry. The basis for this school required a church body to partner in

the lives of the students and in the ministry training. In September 2009, twenty-two years after the dream began, Cross Style Church of the Nazarene was established in Lebanon, Tennessee with Stephen as the lead pastor. Over the last two years, Cross Style Church has aggressively ministered within the community. Whereas some churches are inward focused, Stephen has wanted from the beginning for the pastoral staff, the congregation, and ministry students to be outward focused. The church now runs an emergencyhousing program for the homeless and needy, provides food boxes and serves a daily free hot buffet dinner to the community. Cross Style is invested in nursing homes, the community little league, the local Kiwanis Club, and has recently started a transformation program



(The Lazarus Project) for those with addictions and people coming out of prison or jail. The ministry opportunities have been expanding and opening up in ways that can only be ascribed to Jesus.

STEPHEN MANLEY

Now that a ministry foundation has been laid in the community, Stephen and the Cross Style team are officially launching the Cross Style School of Practical Ministry in January 2012. While we have had a few students as a part of the program thus far, in January, ten international students are planning to join a few others in Lebanon, Tennessee to be the first official class of the school. The outflow and ministry potential as well as the practical investment in the lives of these students cannot be overstated. These ten international students from Africa, India, and Central and South America will be spending a year at the school and will not only be grounded in the Word of God but will also take practical ministry experience back to their countries. It is the passion of everyone in Cross Style, especially Stephen, to have the opportunity to invest in and train up the next generation of leaders, pastors, evangelists, missionaries, and ministers. As such, the Cross Style School of Practical Ministry is focused on three types of individuals: high school graduates who want to spend a summer, semester, or year grounding themselves in the Word to have a Biblical filter before entering college; individuals called to ministry and want practical ministry training; and laymen who want to take their depth and intimacy with Jesus and their Biblical understanding to another level. Summer internships, much like the original evangelist intern program Stephen began, are still available for those who desire to spend a summer immersing themselves in the Word of God and learning servant-hearted

ministry through practical handson experience.

Stephen, now 69, has joked that he has been doing things backwards. Often pastors retire into evangelism but he has been slowly moving out of evangelism to become a full time pastor. Stephen still travels in evangelism, averaging one meeting a month and several camps throughout the summer, but his focus has become the church, school, and community within Lebanon, Tennessee. If you were to ask him when he might consider retiring for good, he would respond with a smirk and tell you it will never happen. And after a lifetime of full time ministry, you might think burnout might become an issue, but long ago Stephen found the solution for burnout: getting into the Word of God. As he says, you never hear a pastor or leader express how exhausted he/she is, and follow that



with "let me tell you of the riches I've been discovering in the Word, how Jesus has been transforming my life, and the intimacy I've been experiencing with Him." Burnout is impossible when one's life is built upon the foundation of the Word and intimacy with Jesus. For Stephen, his life is wrapped up in a total saturation of Jesus and the Word of God. Time in the Word is more than an activity or duty to schedule in his day. It is the delight of his heart and the focus throughout his day because it draws him deeper





into intimacy with Jesus Christ. He wants his "moment-by-moments" saturated with the Person of Jesus and the Word. He longs for Jesus to ever increase and expand in and through His life.

Stephen's life, testimony, and preaching has been used throughout the last six decades to touch. influence, and transform the lives of countless people around the world. But in honest humility, Stephen downplays himself in order to lift up and "push" Jesus. His life is not his own; it is the stage upon which Christ acts, the glove Jesus wears, the voice through which Jesus proclaims Himself to the world, the hands Jesus uses to touch, minister, and love a hurting and needy world. Stephen is a Jesus pusher. He has no other focus than Christ.

"Jesus is present in every situation of my life. There is no conversation in which I do not feel His presence. He participates in all my recreation. He is everywhere I go. Who would want to be without Him? He is the protection for my life. He is the fragrance I constantly smell. He is the flow of my spiritual blood giving me life. He is my constant nutrition making me healthy. I cannot survive without Him. I am a Jesus pusher!!!! I want to push Him on you. I want you to join me in this obsession. You do not have to work at it: it is not a discipline. It is as natural as breathing. Please let Him pull you to His heart." -Stephen Manley

I was standing in the middle row of the filled arena prior to the evening General Assembly service looking for my seat, when Dr. Don Gibson, Secretary of Evangelism in the world wide Church of the Nazarene, stopped me as I was proceeding down the aisle to introduce me to a young man he had with him. He told me his name was Stephen Manley, a new evangelist in our church who had recently joined the denomination. I turned and introduced myself to Stephen extending my hand to him in that first greeting, thrilled at the prospect of a new evangelist joining our ranks. As we walked along together, I did my best to introduce Steve to everyone I passed on the way to my seat. That was a long time ago, and the thought of me introducing (continued on next page)

him to Nazarenes seems almost foolish now, for he is so well known and such an integral part of evangelism in the Church of the Nazarene.

Steve is well educated with an undergraduate degree from Asbury College (now University) and an earned Doctorate in Ministry. Beyond this formal education, his ministry has been characterized by his love of learning and thirst for new understanding. I have preached in camp meetings with Steve when he has preached the entire week from one verse most often from Matthew.

We have heard a lot about hope and change in the last three years. One of the saddest statements the Apostle Paul makes is recorded in Ephesians 2: 12, speaking of the heathen world, he wrote, "having no hope, and without God in the world..." In the constant pursuit of change, too often we find ourselves like the Athenians of Acts 17 who "spent their time in nothing else, but either to tell, or to hear some new thing." If they would have stayed with the 'old paths' (Jeremiah 6:16) they would have found rest for their souls.

In Hebrews 6: 17-20 the writer is speaking to the heirs of promise and the heritage that is promised. He said until they receive their heritage, they lay hold upon the hope as an anchor of the soul. God reveals the inheritance of His people as "that within the veil." The veil that He is speaking of is that which separated the holy place from the holies of holies. The birth of the Spirit makes us heirs and as heirs we, through baptism with the Holy Spirit cast our anchor within the veil, which is an earnest of our full inheritance to come. The word 'anchor' comes from the Greek word that means 'a hook.' If we keep pulling on the rope (rope is our obedient faith) we will ultimately arrive at our final destination.

We are not permanent residents of this world but rather pilgrims on a journey until we enter into the joys of our Lord. The writer says that Jesus is the forerunner. He has gone ahead and made a way for us to come to Him. He's the Rock upon which we hook our anchor. He secures the vessel in time of storm and peril. The anchor is only of service when connected with a good cable. The cable is our faith and when sight and feelings fail us our faith tells us that the Rock never fails. As long as we are anchored "within the veil" it can never drag nor slip no matter how the winds of doubt and unbelief may rage. Our hope in Christ can never fail unless the blood of Jesus should lose its efficacy. As Pilot of the Ship of Zion, He will one day guide us into the harbor of hope and cast anchor and shout, "all out for the New Jerusalem." ★

A REVIVAL MEETING AND THE CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR

On October 8, 1918 after being pinned down in an attempt to capture a narrow gauge railroad, Alvin York took his fateful walk into history. As the company sharp shooter, he and sixteen other soldiers under the command of Acting Sergeant Bernard Early were given the unenviable task of silencing the machine guns that halted the advance the day before. It was a cold, wet morning. Rain mixed with sleet added to the gloom of the fog that draped the landscape. As the soldiers worked their way around the hill, the men on the left flank stood exposed in the creek bottom. German machine gunners opened fire, wounding or killing nine Americans, including York's best friend Murray Savage. York was on the right flank beneath the crest of the hill in a natural depression, which he used to kill nine of the men who operated the guns. In the mean time his comrades opened fire on the Germans and in a few minutes twenty-five were dead. The Germans surrendered to what they thought was a superior force, and York and the American survivors escorted one hundred thirty two prisoners to American forces at Varennes, France some ten miles away. For that he won the Congressional Medal of Honor and a host of other medals.

Three years earlier as York came of age he earned the reputation as a deadly accurate shot and a "hell raiser." Drinking and gambling in borderline bars known as "Blind Tigers," York was generally considered a nuisance and someone who "would never amount to anything." That reputation underwent a serious overhaul when York experienced a religious conversion in 1915. In that year two significant events occurred: his best friend, Everett Delk, was killed in a bar fight in Static, Kentucky, and he attended a revival conducted by H.H. Russell of the Church of Christ in Christian Union. Delk's senseless death convinced York that he needed to change his ways or suffer a fate similar to his fallen comrade, which prompted him to

attend the prayer meeting. The Wolf River Methodist Church is where the York family went to church for many years. Methodist Circuit Riders began preaching there around 1800 and the church only met quarterly until after the Civil War. Because this church did not meet every week until well into the 20th century, the building was shared by a number of denominations over the years. In fact, York's conversion to the Church of Christ in Christian Union in 1915 took place in the Wolf River Methodist Church. Though raised a Methodist, York joined the Church of Christ in Christian Union and in the process convinced one of his best friends, Rosier Pile, to join as well. Blessed with a melodious singing voice, York became the song leader and a Sunday school teacher at the local church. Rosier Pile went on to become the church's pastor. The church also brought York in to contact with Gracie Loretta Williams, who would become his wife on June 7, 1919.

"I got very rough in a way. And this did not suite my mother and she kept begging me to stop and be a better boy. One day there came in our county a little evangelist preacher and he was pounding away and many people was joining the church. And my best girl, she joined the church and that got me to thinking. So one day I made up my mind that mother was getting up in years and was worrying much of her time about me, and losing many nights sleep when I would be out on a wild goose chase. And I began to think, father never did drink, nor play cards, nor smoke cigarettes, nor do things that I was doing. Neither did mother and they both had taught me not to do these things. And I begin to pray for God to help me as a poor sinner to find some relief from my appetite for drink, for cigarettes, for tobacco, for card playing, for swearing, for dancing, for all the things that the



world had that man could not do and be a

The only pain I experienced was when they secured me to the hard board with my head immobilized, then the IV needle missed. The EMT was not given another try. The emergency staff at the hospital was amazed and released me without the usual scans and x-rays. The church gathered together that evening to pray for my healing and for revival. I was able to go and preach the next day because God healed me. Thanks be unto God for His indescribable gift!

To give God all the glory, the Lord gave us a wonderful revival, and the church was able to give a generous



expense and love offering. Have you considered having a revival by faith? Step out on faith! It could be indescribable.

Noises were amplified to the point that she would become nauseous. She testified that God healed her ears and she was able to sit in the rest



of the services without earplugs or medication. The week continued with miracles: one mother was stunned as her two boys in theirs 20s stood to be saved, along with many others who came to know Jesus personally. The blood will never lose its power! The altars lined several nights with believers seeking the Holy Spirit to fill them and sanctify their souls. After the Armistice was signed, I was ordered to go back to the scene of my fight with the machine guns. General Lindsey and some other generals went with me. We went over the ground carefully. The officers spent a right smart amount of time examining the hill and the trenches where the machine guns were, and measuring and discussing everything. And then General Lindsey asked me to describe the fight to him. And I did. And then he asked me to march him out just like I marched the German major out, over the same ground and back to the American lines. Our general was very popular. He was a natural born fighter and he could swear just as awful as he could fight. He could swear most awful bad. And when I marched him back to our old lines he said to me, 'York, how did you do it?' And I answered him, 'Sir, it is not man power. A higher power than man power guided and watched over me and told me what to do.' And the general bowed his head and put his hand on my shoulder and solemnly said, 'York, you are right.'

Most war heroes usually state that the "real heroes" did not come home but are buried on battlefields and in final resting places around the world on land and sea. Sergeant York is a true American war hero in every sense of the word. He is also a hero of the Christian faith. In his hand written testimony taken from his personal diary, he states that he sought and received and kept the cleansing and sanctifying power of Pentecost. Please continue to pray for those serving in our armed forces and their families especially during this holiday season.



MISSIONARY Evangelists

The divine call to go, to preach, and to make disciples is still relevant, and the burning passion to fulfill that call is still answered by many faithful servants that consider it a privilege. When we prayed the Jabez' prayer in faith back in 2004, we had no idea that God would literally take us up on it. He definitely "enlarged our borders" to minister in many places we had never been in the United States and Canada, as well as other world areas. Can we afford it alone? - No! Is God still big enough? - Yes! In ourselves, can we preach and sing effectively and persuasively in other cultures? -No! Is God still able to translate His Truth through the language of love? -Yes! Kingdom compassion encompasses countries, cultures, and economic encumbrances. All ministers may not be categorized in the church as missionaries, but we feel we are-wherever we minister... at home or abroad."

The role of the God-called evangelist continues to evolve in this post-Christian day we live. Revival campaigns and evangelistic crusades are shorter in duration than they used to be. They often focus on particular needs, emphases, or age groups. The Kids' Krusade and Holiness Summit are examples of this. The purpose and methods of the modern evangelist and the missionary converge more today than in the past. The United States now receives many missionaries from other world areas as a mission field.



Missionaries originate from nearly everywhere. Denominations and mission organizations struggle to keep up with the financial support, so more and more missionaries will need to raise their own

funds to continue ministry in foreign lands in years to come. That too, sounds like the faith walk of an evangelist who relies solely on love offerings and honorariums. God is bigger than any obstacle if He is kept at the helm of the vessel.

Hungry For Holiness

The Africa Central Field is made up of 12 districts of the Church of the Nazarene in Malawi, Zambia, and Zimbabwe. Field Strategy Coordinator, Rev. Paul Mtambo, and Africa Regional Director, Dr. Filimao Chambo feel a strong burden for holiness training throughout the region. Many new churches have been formed and much growth in existing churches has been realized in recent months. Pastors and laypeople are hungry for holiness teaching and preaching. It is exciting to sense that desire in hearts growing spiritually and becoming more equipped to teach others in their congregations. After one has been saved from sins past, the miraculous work of entire sanctification is to cleanse the carnal heart and fill with the Holy Spirit and righteousness. It is God's plan for man's victory and universally crucial in every world area. Holiness Conferences have become a highlight for the pastors and laypeople on this field. We have been honored to preach and provide music for the Holiness Conference in Lusaka, Zambia in 2008 and in Harare, Zimbabwe in 2011. Revs. Gary and Penney Sidle, missionaries, have coordinated other revival events such as zone evangelistic crusades and a district wide children's camp crusade. Zambia is an amazing country. English is the official language although other native languages are spoken. They are culturally progressive with the rampant use of cell phones, yet economically poor. Lusaka is the capital, a modern city. Western influence is evident with Subway, KFC, Wal-Mart, and other iconic familiarities. A stark difference is found in the outlying compounds and villages where customs and accommodations are still heavily influenced by historic culture and even a bicycle is a luxury.

Zeal in Zambia

The Church of the Nazarene is growing rapidly in Zambia. In 2006 there were 50 new congregations needing a building of their own for worship and





training. By 2009 there were nearly 300 congregations in the same plight. The evidence of many new church buildings, including a new district center facility to entertain future events is encouraging. Steady growth in 2011 continued to create new demand for personnel and resources. Leadership in the churches emerges through spiritual hunger and obedience. God calls the willing, and immediately the process of theological and pastoral training goes on the fast track. Spiritual maturity takes time, but having a part in that growth is spiritually invigorating to anyone who ministers there.

Drifting Cultures Everywhere

We have ministered in various locations in England, including Clapham Junction, Thomas Memorial, and Bolton, however, the Walthamstow Church of the Nazarene has become a recurring point of ministry and favorite stop for us on our way to or from Africa. Pastor Martin and wife Mavis Seymour are faithful servants and continue to shepherd this wonderful congregation. Holiness evangelism is welcomeand fruitful—as pastor and people hunger for the Truth pertaining to the Spirit-filled walk. Living in a drifting culture is not unique to the western world. In many ways, Europe has felt it first. The sinful, permissive evidence is obvious in public display in all world areas, and yet there are lingering bastions (or should I say remnants) of Wesley's holiness influence in greater London and throughout the United Kingdom. Although we are citizens of heaven as born again believers, we are aliens of this earthly, sinful world. Holiness is the answer to enjoying an anchored faith in a drifting culture.

Missionary Evangelist At Large

Traditionally, the denominational church has licensed different stages of ministry (i.e. local and district licensed minister) and credentialed different categories (i.e. elder, deacon, etc.) after certain criteria are met. The role of those categories can vary according to the specific call of God on one's life (i.e. pastor, missionary, evangelist, song evangelist, minister of music, chaplain, etc.). Furthermore, each of those roles can be further defined in some denominations (i.e. senior pastor, associate pastor, commissioned evangelist, tenured evangelist, etc.). Every minister should be "mission-al" in his/ her approach to propagating the gospel of Jesus Christ. It doesn't just happen because God is able. He uses willing, earthen vessels and enables gifts and graces to communicate His Word in a variety of settings. "Mission-al" strategy means mission with a plan. Transformed lives living for Christ is the mission. Salvation and sanctification of souls is the plan. Many people think it more adventurous to hear the stories of God's great work in far away lands than in close by communities. However, the



miracles of sins forgiven, cleansed natures, physical healings, and addiction deliverances are not reserved for certain foreign countries. The cause of evangelism in any language, country, or culture is highly favored and blessed by the Father and He is still in the miracle business. Regardless of who said it first, it's true that, "Every person knowing Christ as Lord is a missionary—Every person without Christ is a mission field." Home missions, foreign missions, compassionate ministry with a witness, revivalism, camp meetings, and holiness conferences are all under the umbrella of what Paul told his young friend Timothy to do when he said, "Do the work of an evangelist." After 40 consecutive years of itinerant ministry, I gladly testify to God's faithfulness in every way. Yes, "Faithful is He who calls us, who also will do it!" We are called to holy living, preaching, teaching, singing, and witnessing wherever the charge or the chance. In fact, every "chance" to demonstrate Jesus and help others find Him is a "charge" by God. ★
